






# WHO WERE THE ANGLO-SAXONS?







The Anglo Saxons settled in Britain from AD410 to 1066. They arrived after the last of the Roman soldiers had left in 410.

The Anglo Saxons travelled in tribes across the North Sea from the Netherlands, Denmark and Germany.

The three largest Anglo-Saxon tribes were the Angles, who mostly settled in the North of England, the Saxons, who mostly settled in the midlands and South East of England and the Jutes who settled on the South coast.

### Romans

The tribes of Scotland, angry with the Romans for driving them further North, beyond Hadrian's wall. When the Romans left, they began invading parts of Northern Britain again.

### **Britons**

Originally from Italy, settled in Britain from 43 - 410 AD. Left to defend their homeland against invaders.

# Anglo-Saxons

Tribes of people who had been living in Britain for hundreds of years. Lived happily alongside the Romans. They had to get used to a new way of life when the Anglo-Saxons invaded.

## Picts

Invading tribes from Northern Europe. Attracted to Britain once the Roman army had left and the country was undefended. Some wanted a peaceful place to live. Others were prepared to fight the Britons to get what they wanted!
